

# B'nai Israel Reform Temple Bulletin





Some of us look forward to gardening, walking outside, going to a park, or simply walking a beloved dog in warmer weather.

However we embrace this season, it is no coincidence that the holiday of Passover traditionally falls in this time frame. Passover at its heart is the story of redemption and rebirth. Following us as we travel from slavery to freedom and ultimately to a new homeland to begin anew.

The budding optimism that we feel with warmer weather and flowering blossoms is similar to the hope of reaching the promised land in the Exodus story that we retell in our Haggadah.

Passover is also the beginning of the agricultural season. That same hope also rested with the farmers of ancient times who thought about the promise of opportunity, the hope we attached to the growing and harvesting season.

The new season also brings us the opportunity to embrace new meanings and interpretations of this sacred holiday steeped in ritual and tradition. This year, CCAR press released a new Haggadah, *Mishkan HaSeder*. It is designed in a similar style as the dark blue shabbat *Mishkan Tefillah* and *Mishkan HaNefesh* (the new High Holy Day Prayerbook). This Haggadah is filled with prayers similar to what we know and remember. Yet, it looks beyond the familiar and explores the ideas behind the liturgy and the themes that are at the root of our Passover rituals with creative poetry. And while the poems may not appear to relate directly to the sections they are in, they absolutely bring to life new ways to think about each Seder step. As I examine it today in preparation for our *Seder* in March, I find that several of the lyrics and verses mention Spring and lift up the themes of resilience, optimism, and joy that are part of this awakening season.

A good example of this is in the *karpas* section where we find the blessing over the parsley or vegetable. Here we find two readings that almost stand in stark contrast to one another, both highlighting the idea of spring, one of the reasons we eat karpas. The first is "Arise My Love," lyrics from Debbie Freidman Z"L based on the *Song of Songs*. We read, "Rise up, my love, my fair one, and come away for lo, the winter's past, and the rain is gone; the flowers appear on the earth; the time of singing is come... the fig tree bringeth forth her green figs, and the vines in blossom bring forth their fragrance.."

In these joyous lyrics, we find love, and we take a moment to honor all that is fresh, new, and green; Friedman taps into several senses, including sight, smell and sound. It reads almost like an invitation to skip through the park and take in every new bud we can find. But Spring isn't just about renewal, it's also about where we are coming from. The Israelites have come from slavery and uncertainly, torture and bitter labor.

And so, recognizing this truth, at the bottom of the page, there is a poem called, "Instructions on Not Giving Up," by Ada Limón. It states, "More than the fuchsia funnels breaking out of the crabapple tree, more than the neighbor's almost obscene display of cherry limbs shoving their cotton candy blossoms to the slate sky of Spring rains, it's the greening of the trees that really gets to me. When all the shock of the white and taffy... leave the pavement strewn with confetti of aftermath, the leaves come. ...patient, plodding a green skin growing over whatever winter did to us, a return to the strange idea of continuous living despite the mess of us, the hurt, the empty. Fine then, I'll take it the trees seems to say, a new slick leaf unfurling like a fist to an open palm, I'll take it all."


Ada's poem focuses on a resilience, and the promise that hope, greenery and Spring will indeed emerge each year bringing a renewal after the hurt and emptiness of winter. To have the spring we still need the bleak winter from where it comes. We can't give up, just because it gets rough, spring is here, and with it the promise of a new tomorrow.

Let's take that to heart as we celebrate the second half of our Passover holiday this April.

Spring is here; let us take to heart the difficult and the beautiful dimensions of this season. And may the poetry of our holiday fill our souls with hope and renewal. Chag Sameach!

## Emergency Blood Drive at B'nai Israel!

Having canceled three annual blood drives during the past year, we were approached by the Long Island Blood Center to help now by re-opening our Temple for a Blood Drive in our social hall on Monday, April 26th, from 1:00 to 7:00 PM.

With blood donations limited to the Blood Center's fixed locations during most of the pandemic, a **Blood Emergency** was declared on March 15th. As we approach a historical shortage during the Passover/Easter period, the supply on hand is already at a critically low level. And B'nai Israel can help!

We have been assured that Covid-19 protocols in place and fine-tuned over the past year in their own facilities will be strictly adhered to, including temperature checks, masks, social distancing, cleanliness, etc. To avoid crowding and limiting wait times, every donor is encouraged to make an appointment. Although we always welcome walk-ins, due to the above, they will be handled on a space-available basis only.

The three vaccines available in the United States at this time impose no restrictions on the ability to donate. Wellness protocols require that a donor be healthy at the time of the donation and other long-standing limitations based on travel and medications remain in effect. Please make a note on your calendar and call the Temple Office 631-563-1660 to make an appointment that is convenient for you.

To expedite check-in, bring your Donor Card if you have one and a picture ID. Teens may donate at 16 years old with written permission from a parent and seniors beginning at age 75 require written permission from a physician.

As always, sign up eligible family and friends. Blood donations have never been as important as they are right now! Thank you.

#### What is the goal?

#### What is a circle?

Circles are not classes, social clubs or group therapy, although there will be learning, support and enjoyment.

Our pilot circles will have specific themes such as Mussar (How do we live our everyday life?), Here all Along (finding meaning and connection through Sarah Hurwitz's new insights to discovering the beauty and value that exist within Judaism), and Becoming a Soulful Parent (exploring the challenges and the joys of navigating parenthood through discussion, listening and sharing).

Agree to participate in five, one-hour online sessions, and one intro session all together (on **Sunday, April 18<sup>th</sup>** in the late afternoon) that take place over a couple of months. Read the chapter of the book your circle is sharing before each session. Commit to listening, sharing and participating with honesty and integrity. 
