Rabbi Rosenthal's Message

Be happy, it's Adar!

This is a phrase we often hear around this time of year because our religion actually **commands** us to be happy. I don't know about you, but when someone commands me to feel a certain way, it's not always easy to conjure up that feeling in an authentic way.

This is especially true as we are still in the midst of winter's coldest, darkest months, not to mention the aftermath of frightening situations such as Collevville.

The origin of our commandment appears under similar circumstances. We do not read about this mitzvah in Talmud tractate megillah which details the celebration of Purim, but rather in Talmud Tractate Taanit, which discusses the tragedies of Tisha b'av and the sadness and mourning we endure during that time.

We read in Tagnit 20a. "Just as when Av begins one decreases rejoicing, so too when the month of Adar begins, one

We read in Taanit 29a, "Just as when Av begins one decreases rejoicing, so too when the month of Adar begins, one increases rejoicing."

This seems like an odd context to mention joy.

It's difficult to be joyous when mourning. But it's times like those that remind us that life is about finding balance. Perhaps this is what our tradition seeks to do: to remind us that when we mourn, it is often a direct result of the great love and joy that we had. And that often it is love and joy that help us accept our grief. That love is the highest of highs, the holiest of holies, and so it is sacred. And so is the authentic sadness we feel when we miss it. Both feelings are tied together as an authentic part of the human experience.

A similar set of emotions play out during holiday of Adar, Purim. In Shushan, it was not safe to be Jewish. Esther must hide the fact that she is Jewish from her king, Ahasuerus. Then we read about Haman, who threatens to kill all of the Jewish people. Mordechai, Esther's relative goes into mourning and begs Esther to intercede. The people are all understandably in a great low at this moment: they are scared. And then something inspiring happens. In order to save herself, and the Jewish people, Esther finds the courage within to reveal who she is. In doing so, she brings one of the greatest joys and greatest celebrations to her people and future generations, for her actions directly lead to their safety.

Like our ancestors' story, joy can come when we least expect it, when we are at our lowest low. And we too can find a way to create balance in life, adding joy to our experiences.

Perhaps then, instead of seeing, "be happy it's Adar," as a commandment, we might view it as an invitation, to search for the hidden joys that are waiting to be revealed through our courage, creativity and persistence.

This has certainly been part of my journey as I plan and prepare for Adar 2 (this year there are two months of Adar - similar to a leap year).

On a personal level, this is the time that I restart my garden. Planting seeds for the vegetables that I won't get to enjoy until late spring at the earliest. I love to see how my hard work and the natural cycle of the world helps make the tiny sprouts spring forth.

And on a congregational level, we have in person holidays to plan and celebrate. I am already working with the cantor and the ritual committee on finding humor to invite into our service as we play out the comedic side of a murder mystery Purim theme. In addition, looking for meaningful readings and creative prayers for our in person congregational Passover seder is filling me with hope and joy at the prospect of being together once more for this holiday of freedom.

On a community level, I was invited to participate in a few communal events including the Jewish University program held at Stony Brook University, and a panel of women rabbis who will share personal stories of hope and healing at the SYJCC this month. Participating in the greater community is an important reminder that we are all in it together and that Suffolk County Jewish community is beautiful and vibrant.

And I have to admit, that all of this planning, and participation brings me authentic and pure joy.

May we all find ways to invite in balance and both the hidden and visible joy around us into our lives the coming month.

And may we all have a healthy and happy Purim!

VACCINE / NEGATIVE TEST REQUIRED AND MASKS MUST BE WORN IN THE BUILDING.



Dear Temple Families,

In my first Temple Bulletin article last July, I spoke of the coming year as "Back to the Future," because we were just returning to in-person services and in-school learning, but we intended to keep up the streaming of services, enhanced website features, and other innovations that helped us to connect with families during the pandemic.

These efforts have been very successful, allowing members to choose which type of service and event is best for them. Masks were required for all in-person events, and due to the Delta variant and later Omicron, we transitioned to requiring proof of vaccination or a recent negative COVID test for attendance at in-person services.

I am now hearing from a modest (and passionate) number of members that they feel it is time to drop all restrictions and fully reopen. As I write this, I don't know when this will happen. While we are a reform congregation, we are quite conservative when it comes to

health and safety. The Temple Board must decide what is right for the congregation and staff, and the School Board must decide what is right for the students and faculty. Believe me, these decisions are not easy to make!

The good news is that we have already decided to hold a Purim Carnival on March 12th, a Sisterhood Women's Seder on March 22nd, and a Temple Seder on April 15th. Needless to say, masks will not be worn while eating. On the other hand, we are likely to continue following CDC guidance which still recommends mask wearing indoors. If we can get away from the rhetoric and divisiveness surrounding mask wearing for a moment, we can see that our students are required to wear a mask at religious school for a couple of hours once a week, and the congregants at services have an even shorter time in a mask. We are not a workplace where people need to wear masks eight hours a day, five days a week.

In other good news, we are working on a transition back to onegs after services (date to be announced). People who are uncomfortable with removing masks will be able to leave after the service and not risk exposure to those who chose to participate in the oneg.

The faster the number of positive cases decline, the faster we will reopen. Keep an eye on the website for updates.

Please, please, please be patient. The Temple Board and School Board are all volunteers, and none of us have a political agenda.

While major league baseball is mired in labor negotiations and as I write this, is delaying the start of spring training, our Long Island Ducks are gearing up for a full season of baseball **beginning in late April**. And B'nai Israel is gearing up for its biggest fund-raising opportunity of the year by working at concession stands and **earning a 10% commission on all sales of food and beverages**.

We have been invited back by Ducks management and contracted to work **Saturday and Wednesday evening home games** this season. To put it in perspective, in a pandemic-shortened 2021 season, with fewer games and less than normal attendance, **we received almost \$14,000 in commissions**. Not only our most profitable fund-raiser, but more net income than all other Temple fund-raisers combined. Our only investment in this endeavor is time; the time our volunteers spend working at the Ducks stadium in Central Islip.

As always, more volunteers are needed. Our income is limited only by how many people we can sign up to work at any given game. No one is expected to work all, or even most of the games. If you've worked with us in the past, we'll reach out and ask that you do so again this year. If you've never done it before, please offer to give it a try. Volunteers must be 16 years old and physically able to work on their feet for four or five hours at a time. Cash registers, new last season, are tablet-based and easy to learn and operate. Training is done on-the-job. With an early start and some practice before the game, everyone is ready to go by the time gates open. Uniform tee shirts and hats will be provided.

Can't get to the stadium by 4:30 on a weeknight? How about Saturday? Don't want to spend Saturday evening with us, (although it's a cheap date and couples are always welcome,) then how about Wednesday?

Simply stated, without your help this terrific opportunity can't happen! The first game is Saturday evening, April 23rd. It's not too soon to sign-up. To see the complete schedule, see below. For questions and to volunteer, email ducks@bnai-israel.org. Thank you.






