Rabbi Rosenthal's Message

In the upcoming days, we will be celebrating Passover, the festival of freedom. Freedom is a word that is often repeated throughout the seder. Yet, we don't always ask what it truly means and when exactly the Jews became free.

In the most basic sense, freedom is the ability to choose our actions, words and thoughts without constraint and to no longer be enslaved. Certainly, our escape from slavery is worthy of celebration. But recently, I have come to believe this is only the beginning of the story. Because while escaping from slavery is always a worthy goal, it isn't enough.

In the Exodus narrative that we retell each Passover, we begin enslaved in Egypt. When God, Moses and Aaron work together to free the Israelites, they save our ancestors from tyranny and oppression. After the people cross the sea, and escape pharaoh's army, Miriam leads the people in song and dance, as they celebrate freedom and redemption.

But this is not the end of our story of freedom. There is another dramatic and central chapter in our drama, namely the giving and receiving of the 10 commandments.

It's only when we agree to follow the values in the Torah that the Israelites are able to take those essential steps beyond mere freedom and recognize that there is a responsibility to do more.

Of the many commandments that we agreed to follow was the command to care for the stranger. The Rabbis say every word in the Torah is holy and important. So when words are repeated, it adds extra weight to what is being said. The command to care for the stranger was not just mentioned once or twice, but instead 36 times, more than any other commandment.

And the understandable reason is because we were once strangers in the land of Egypt. We were once slaves in the land of Egypt, and so it is our responsibility not only to enjoy freedom for ourselves but to ensure that others have access to those same human rights.

Our Reform Haggadah mentions this aspect of freedom, in one contemporary rendition of *dayeinu*, entitled, *lo dayeinu*, it is not enough, written by Rabbi Donald Rossoff.

Here we find a verse that speaks to this understanding of freedom. It says,

"Were all of God's children to be free from the threat of violence, abuse, and domination... *lo dayeinu* (it would not be enough)."

This rings true today. Rabbi Zoë Klein Miles expands upon it saying that not only are we required to do more, but if we don't, we face consequences.

She writes, "...to be free without any direction, support, or purpose is to be lost.... God chose us to be partners in repairing this world. We're grateful, but also dissatisfied. Now, it's time to roll up our sleeves and continue getting this place cleaned up.

Freedom without guidance and responsibility is empty and not enough, it leads us astray and causes us to wander aimlessly in the wilderness. Passover can and should be a reminder that we need to do more. This year let us commit to a cause that is greater than ourselves: aiding Ukrainian refugees, standing up against intolerance and hate, racism and homophobia, or aiding those who are homeless or hungry.

Our freedom allows us and begs us to take those extra steps. Because as Dr. Martin Luther King once famously said, no one is free until we are all free.

May our Passover celebrations be filled with joy, connection and true freedom!

Come Join us In-Person, Volunteer, and Support the Ukrainians

Dear Temple Families,

It is so nice to see increasing daylight, the arrival of spring, and **good things happening at the Temple.**

We had a well attended Purim service and spiel on March 11th, followed by a fun-filled Carnival on the 12th. The Sisterhood then held a special Women's Seder on March 20th. The Temple has resumed modest onegs after Friday night services, and all is going well. Please join us for services and for the many happy events that are on our calendar.

If you have a child in the Religious School, you probably know that the School Board has made mask wearing optional for attending classes, similar to most public schools.

The Temple Board of Trustees held a special meeting on March 20th to review COVID policies. It was decided that as of April 1st, mask wearing will be optional for all fully vaccinated attendees but remain mandatory for unvaccinated persons. Checks will no longer be performed at the door. We will continue to monitor the spread of the virus and variants and we may institute new restrictions if deemed necessary. Please note that vaccination requirements will remain in effect for the Temple Seder on April 15th.

B'nai Israel has a tiny paid staff, and most of the work to plan and run events and fundraisers is done by a modest group of hard-working volunteers. If you have a little time to spare on an occasional basis, please volunteer to serve on a Temple Committee, the Sisterhood or Brotherhood, join the Choir, help with the Ducks Concession, etc. As the saying goes, "Many hands lighten the load." Volunteering helps the Temple immeasurably and gives you the opportunity to meet nice people who are trying to make a difference in the community.

Lastly, the B'nai Israel community is keeping Ukraine and its besieged countrymen close in our thoughts and prayers during these tragic days. Our request for donations to HIAS in support of Ukrainian refugees has led to a contribution of over \$2,700 so far, including a special outreach donation from the Temple and another from the Sisterhood. Thank you to all who made this possible.

Thank you to everyone who has so generously sent donations to the Temple for HIAS. As always, when we sent out the call for help, you responded in a huge way and it is greatly appreciated.

HIAS is an amazing organization which has supported Ukraine and its refugees for decades. They are trying to meet this current horrifying humanitarian situation by providing food, medical supplies and care, and clothes. They are placing families in safe homes, trying to locate relatives with whom to place refugees, offering emotional support, and so very much more.

I watched a webinar where a panel of HIAS representatives, who had just returned from Ukraine, were describing what they had witnessed while there. Pictures of the cities were shown as people were escaping with only the clothes on their backs and a small suitcase or duffle bag. They were cramming as many people as possible onto trains and taking them into safety in Poland. I found myself sobbing as I thought of my Dad and his family, in a different era, being pushed into a different kind of railcar and taken out of their country with many of them not surviving. As human beings, and especially as Jews, we can't stand by without offering some kind of aid and support,

B'nai Israel will host its annual spring blood drive on Monday, April 25th, from 3:00 PM to 7:30 PM. **(Please note the revised hours.)** What has become a "traditional" shortage of blood in the New York Metropolitan area has become a national shortage as the result of the pandemic, only expected to become more critical around the spring Passover and Easter holidays. **We can help!**

Donors can be as young as sixteen, (with parent's written permission,) or 75+ (with a physician's written permission.) Temple membership is not required so friends, neighbors and extended family will be welcome. Repeat donors can expedite the sign-in process by bringing their donor cards and every potential donor must have a photo ID. The Long Island Blood Center follows all CDC-recommended Covid protocols and donors' Covid history is not a factor.

Although appointments are not required and walk-ins are always welcome, appointments made in advance on-line help to smooth the work flow and avoid unnecessary delays. Please make an appointment if you can and plan to donate on April 25th.

Along with the major leagues, (at last,) our Long Island Ducks are gearing up for a full season of baseball beginning at the end of April. And B'nai Israel is gearing up for its biggest fund-raising opportunity of the year by working at concession stands and **earning a 10% commission on all sales of food and beverages.**

We have been invited back by Ducks management and contracted to work **Saturday and Wednesday evening home games** this season. To put it in perspective, in a pandemic-shortened 2021 season, with fewer games and less than normal attendance, **we received almost \$14,000 in commissions.** Not only our most profitable fund-raiser, but more net income than all other Temple fund-raisers combined. Our only investment in this endeavor is time; the time our volunteers spend working at the Ducks stadium in Central Islip.

As always, **more volunteers are needed.** Our income is limited only by how many people we can sign up to work at any given game. No one is expected to work all, or even most of the games. If you've worked with us in the past, we'll reach out and ask that you do so again this year. **If you've never done it before, please offer to give it a try.** Volunteers must be 16 years old and physically able to work on their feet for four or five hours at a time. Cash registers, new last season, are tablet-based and easy to learn and operate. **Training is done on-the-job.** With an early start and some practice before the game, everyone is ready to go by the time gates open. **Uniform tee shirts and hats will be provided.**

Can't get to the stadium by 4:30 on a weeknight? How about Saturday? Don't want to spend Saturday evening with us, (although it's a cheap date and couples are always welcome,) then how about Wednesday?

Simply stated, **without your help this terrific opportunity can't happen!** The first game is Saturday evening, April 23rd. It's not too soon to sign-up. To see the complete schedule, see below. **For questions and to volunteer, email ducks@bnai-israel.org.** Thank you.




